



Let's look at a few reasons which should interest parents, teachers and students. These statistics were from the 1968 report from the Columbia County Juvenile Office . But PLEASE don't bug them about the Youth Center, bug us!

1. Officer Dressler of the St. Helens City Police said that 60 per cent of the teen-agers in the Jr. High and Sr. High combined have tried marijuana (pot).

2. One out of every five teen-agers, by the time he is out of high school, has made at least one law violation. This could be a minor in possession, driver's violation, drugs, curfew, etc.

3. In St. Helens there were 283 referrals to the juvenile department in 1968. There is an approximate increase of about 300 young persons county- wide, per year.

4. In 1968 there were five teenagers sent to corrective homes. 5. In 1967 the total number of teen-agers caught for possession of liquor was 120. In 1968 it was 144. With a certain amount of increase over the years, can you imagine what it is going to be like this year?

6. The number of runaways for 1968 was 69. Is there a just-ifiable reason for so many kids leaving their homes and this town?

There are many more categories of crimes which are made in this community and there has be something done about it. We just can't sit back and let the kids of this community go to ruin!

A Youth Center wouldn't completely stop each problem, but it would be a start. If run properly with the help of parents, police, and most of all, the students themselves, this would be a most lens and the surrounding area greatly.
