Homecoming week events announced Nader surprise speaker at OSP meet

Homecoming week will be Oct. 26-30 at SHSHS. The events of the week will lead up to the football game between the St. Helens Lions and the Canby Cougars.

Monday night will be the annual Alumni game for graduates of SHSHS of '65 or before. No admission will be charged, but programs will be sold. Lettermen are in charge of arrangements.

Tuesday will be Scrub Day. Students should wear scrubby clothes but, no bathing suits, hats, cut-offs or bare feet will be allowed.

Wednesday will be Clash Day. Regular school clothes should be worn with colors mixed to clash. The same points as for Scrub Day will be awarded. School Colors Day will be on Thursday. Wear lemon and black. No class competition will be held on Thursday. On Thursday night the Serpentine and rally will be held.

Students wishing to participate in the serpentine meet at Condo. at 6:15. Marching will begin at 6:30. The route is from Thriftway to the stop-light at Columbia Blvd. and Highway 30. The parade will include flatbed trucks with the team and court on one and the pep band on the other, also all members of the student body who wish to take part. Classes are encouraged to have class, team, or school banners, but they will not be judged for competition.

The Rally will begin at 8:00 p.m. following the serpentine. It will consist of the Coronation of Homecoming Court; presentation of the team; short talk by Heinie Heumann; Senior, Junior, and Sophomore skit; and a speech by Mr. Green.

Emcee for the evening will be Neil Wilburn. Music during coronation will be provided by Tim Minkiel on the piano.

On Friday, Dress-up Day, everyone should dress in nice clothes in honor of the new queen, the court, and the players. The Pep Assembly in the afternoon will consist of introduction of the Court, speeches by coaches and members of the team, and Competition yells; Classes, boys vs. girls, and Lettermen vs. Pep Club.

Friday night at the game, half-time entertainment will include introduction of Homecoming Court, routine by Pep Band and announcement of the class winner of the week's events.

Points awarded will be as follows; Scrub Day: 25 points to the best-dressed girl and boy. Clash Day: same as for Scrub Day. Homecoming skits on Thursday night: 100 points for first place, 50 points for second, and 25 points for third. Each skit will be judged on theme, originality, time limit, (5-7 minutes), number of participants, and sportsmanship. Homecoming rally on Thursday night, 75 points for first, 50 points for second, and 25 for third. Pep Assembly on Friday: same as for Rally on Thursday.


"Charley's Aunt" Cast for fall play

Former staff member uses writing talent in WAC trainee program

Katie Jewell, last years feature editor for the Lions Roar, is now studying to be a combat reporter, at Fort Benjamin Harrison, North Carolina.

The school is very selective. To enter you must pass two security tests. She had to send all the material that she had written for the Lions Roar to headquarters for approval.

Fort Benjamin Harrison is the only school of this type for the Armed Forces. There are Screaming Eagles, a special group of the Air Forces, and the Green Berets in training there.

Katie is the only 18 year old in her classes and there are two other girls in a class of 175 men. Most of the men have their master's degree and are 24 or older. Katie says that they are a great help and have to approve of whom she dates.

The school is much like a college campus and is close to Indianapolis. Katie says the school is terribly exciting. Her classes consist of International Protocol, (learning not to offend someone of another country), Radio and Television, Writing Own Materials for Radio and Television, Interviewing (personalities like Bob Hope or one of the Generals) and Communism. She sometimes spends six hours a day at a typewriter and one day she spent two hours watching herself on television for criticism.

Katie gets up at five a.m. and classes are over at 4 p.m. with "gobs" of homework.

Katie left in June for six months of basic training at Fort McClellam, Alabama.

Katie also has an older sister, Natalie, in the service in the Far East.

SHSHS hosts college reps

Members from seven different Colleges visited St. Helens High School on Oct. 19th. They included members from Oregon State, Oregon College of Education, Oregon Technical Institute, Portland State, Southern Oregon College of Education, Eastern Oregon College of Education, and the University of Oregon. The representatives stayed from nine to twelve during which time they spoke to all the classes in a general assembly. After this they invited the seniors to attend two special question groups on the colleges of their choice and the juniors were invited to attend one.

Iowa Tests administered

Juniors spent Tuesday morning, Oct. 13, taking the Iowa achievement tests.

The Iowa Tests have been published since 1942. The first had nine parts. The version which the juniors took had eight separate parts, Reading, Comprehension and Vocabulary, Language Arts, Usage and Spelling, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and the Use of Sources. Each of these were designed to measure the student's ability to succeed in high school and college.

These tests concentrate on broad intellectual skills and understanding and on ability to use what one has learned. They took about three and a half hours, where the tests taken in years before took seven hours and fifty minutes. Andy Knudsen, junior adviser, made the decision to change to the shorter version and coordinated the program.

The purposes of the test are to survey one's knowledge and to get a context of one's ability, as well as to see how much has been achieved since the ninth grade. A side benefit is the strengthening of the educational program of the school. The information gained from the results may be used to figure out a program for the class or for a special group.

The ITED, Iowa Test of Educational Development, is published and processed by SRA, a subsidiary of IBM. The test is graded and marked by computer and is scored as to the number right compared with other high school scores throughout the country.

Pre SAT Tests given

Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests (Pre SAT) were given to the juniors on Oct. 20. The cost of the test was \$1.50. The test lasted two hours and is used to see if a student would have a good chance in college. The test is broken into two main headings, English and Math and is graded on a twenty to eighty scale. These tests are just a preliminary to the SAT tests the seniors take at a Portland school. The SAT tests start Nov. 7th and go through April 17th with one test a month.

New regulations recommended in committee report

The Student-Faculty Committee submitted a report to Student Council on Oct. 2, stating that after a review of the suggestions of the Faculty and Student Council, the student-faculty committee has revised their recommendations as follows:

A. A student holding one of these offices can hold no other: Student Body Office, Class or club president (except band or choir), class or club secretary (except band or choir), cheerleader, or Mascot.

B. A student holding two of these offices can hold no other: class or club office other than president or secretary, band or choir office or Editor of the annual or newspaper.

C. A student resigning from any of these offices may not accept any other office during the

same tenure period.
D. A student may not be a candidate for more than one office at a time.

E. The position of team captain will not affect the recommendations listed above.

The committee suggests that these recommendations, if adopted by the Faculty and Student Council, be subject to review at least once a year, and at any other time when the formation of a club or a revision in the constitution of an existing class or club creates a need for such a review. It is also suggested that the vice president of the Student Body be charged with the responsibility of seeing that these regulations are observed and that all organizations hold their elections at the designated time.


Turning in good performances on defense were Mike McCain, Al Pidcock, Mike Peterson and Gary Cooper.

Cross Country Team wins one ties one


TILLAMOOK


McMINNVILLE
