## Mayor visits Choir presents Annual Concert

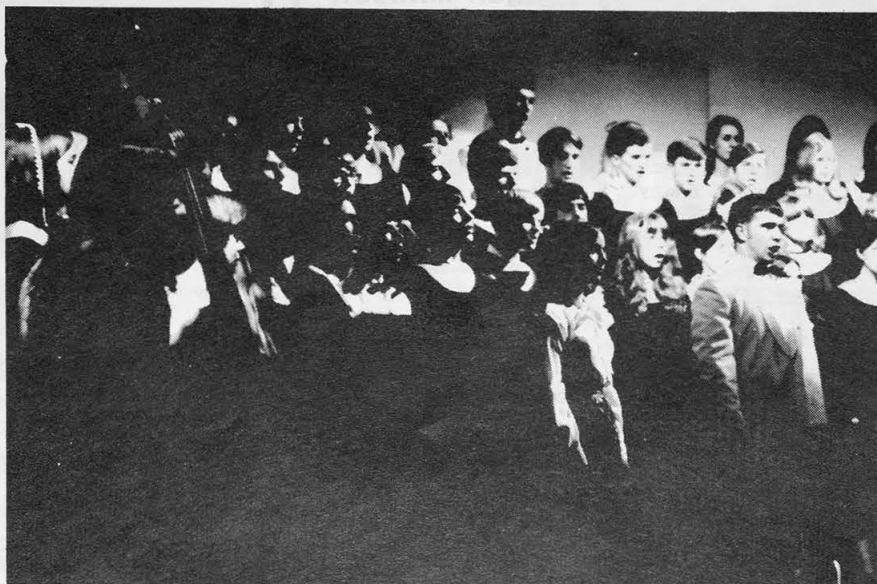

## Teacher Editorial

## UP FRONT

with Mr. Stewart

When asked to write an article for the Lions Roar, I found myself at a loss for sake of a subject. After a week or two of mulling this over in my mind, I came up with the idea of writing about teachers that we have here at St. Helens Senior High School that actually graduated, themselves, from our high school.

Miss Jean Larson attended Yankton Grade School and was a 1934 graduate from SHSHS. Miss Larson was Valedictorian of her class (which had 76 students in it). Some of the activities that were of interest to Miss Larson were Speech and Drama and, of course, Girl's League. She liked all of her classes except Math and P.E., her favorites were French, History and Zoology. Miss Larson indicated to me that she was one of those active students that engaged in all sorts of activities, even operettas, if you can imagine that. Have you ever heard her sing Jingle Bells? Miss Larson attended the University of Oregon and graduated in 1938, from there, she taught at Talent, Oregon for three years and North Bend High School for two years. She moved to St. Helens High School in 1943 and since that time, has taught such subjects as World Geography, World History, U.S. History, Social Economics, American Problems, and Modern Problems. Miss Larson is presently teaching one class of Modern Problems, Counseling, and is the Dean of Girls.

Miss Valerie O'Conner attended John Gumm Grade School and was a 1940 graduate of SHSHS. Miss O'Conner was interested in Pep Club and IRL as a high school student. She entered Oregon College of Education upon graduation from St. Helens. Miss O'Conner graduated from OCE in 1943. She taught in Portland for two years before coming to St. Helens in 1945. At St. Helens Miss O'Conner has taught U.S. History, English III, Journalism, typing and World History. She is presently the Librarian. During the war years in Portland, Miss O'Conner also taught Boys' and Girls' P.E.

Mr. Wayne Bartlett attended John Gumm grade school and was a 1954 graduate of SHSHS. While at St. Helens, Mr. Bartlett enjoyed working in the library, athletics, particularly football in which he played fullback and was Co-Captain his senior year.

Mr. Bartlett was a 1968 graduate of Portland State University. He came directly to St. Helens High School upon graduation from college. Biology, physical science, Consumer Math, and Audio Visual are the areas in which Mr. Bartlett is active.

Mrs. Judith Parmley, formerly Judy Lungberg, attended McBride Grade School and graduated from St. Helens Senior High in 1961. She indicates the things she liked best about high school was the disciplined classroom where learning was able to take place and the stress given was on academic achievement. Mrs. Parmley was salutatorian of her class. She belonged to FTA, National Honor Society, Forensic, Girl's League, and served on the Student Council. Mrs. Parmley was a 1965 graduate of Linfield College. She spent one year at McMinnville High School and came here in the fall of 1966 where she has taught Senior English ever since.

Mrs. Kathie Paulson, formerly Kathie Sherlock, attended St. Frederic's Grade School and was a 1962 graduate of St. Helens. Mrs. Paulson indicates Miss Larson's Modern Problems class, majorettes, FHA, and FTA as enjoyable memories from her high school days. Mrs. Paulson was on the Prom Court as a senior and was the winner of the Betty Crocker homemaking award, along with being Carol Contest accompanist for three years. She graduated from Oregon State University in 1966, taught two years at Molalla Union High School, then came to St. Helens in 1968 where she since has been our Home Economics teacher.

Mr. Douglas Wilson attended McBride grade school and was a 1966 St. Helens graduate. Mr. Wilson was Student Body President his senior year and was very

active in athletics, particularly football and track. He was the winner of the Adams Cup for the outstanding scholar-athlete of his class as well as the Rutheford Cup for the most outstanding all-around student. Mr. Wilson graduated from Oregon State University in 1970, has spent 6 months in the service and just recently taken over teaching responsibilities in Mechanical Drawing.

I, also, was a graduate of St. Helens High School in 1957. Prior to high school, I attended Deer Island and John Gumm Grade Schools. In high school, I was interested in most activities and athletics in particular, as I participated in Football, basketball, and track. After high school, I attended Pacific University from which I graduated in 1961. I spent one year teaching and coaching at Yamhill-Carlton and in 1962 came to St. Helens as a Biology teacher and a coach in football, basketball, and track. I have had mixed feelings since becoming vice-principal in 1969. I miss very much the association with the students that I had in the class room, and of course, I miss coaching.

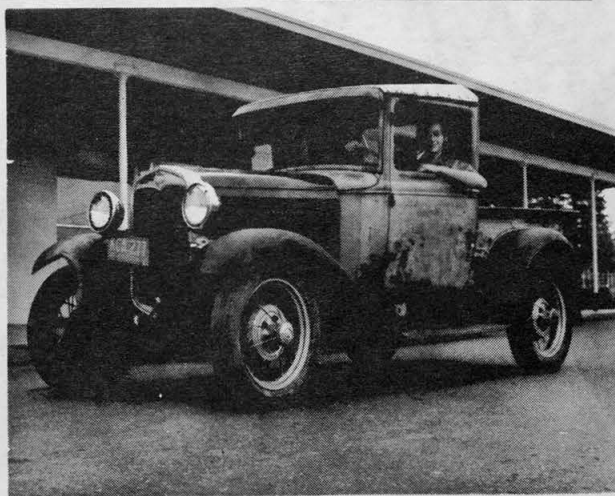

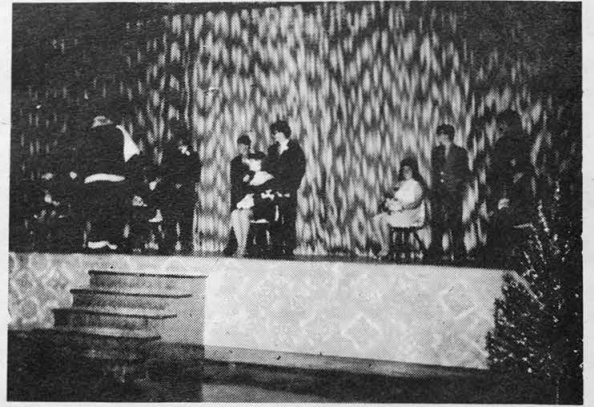

Top scorers of the game were Mike McCain - 17, Greg Fischer - 16, and Lenard Mason - 16.

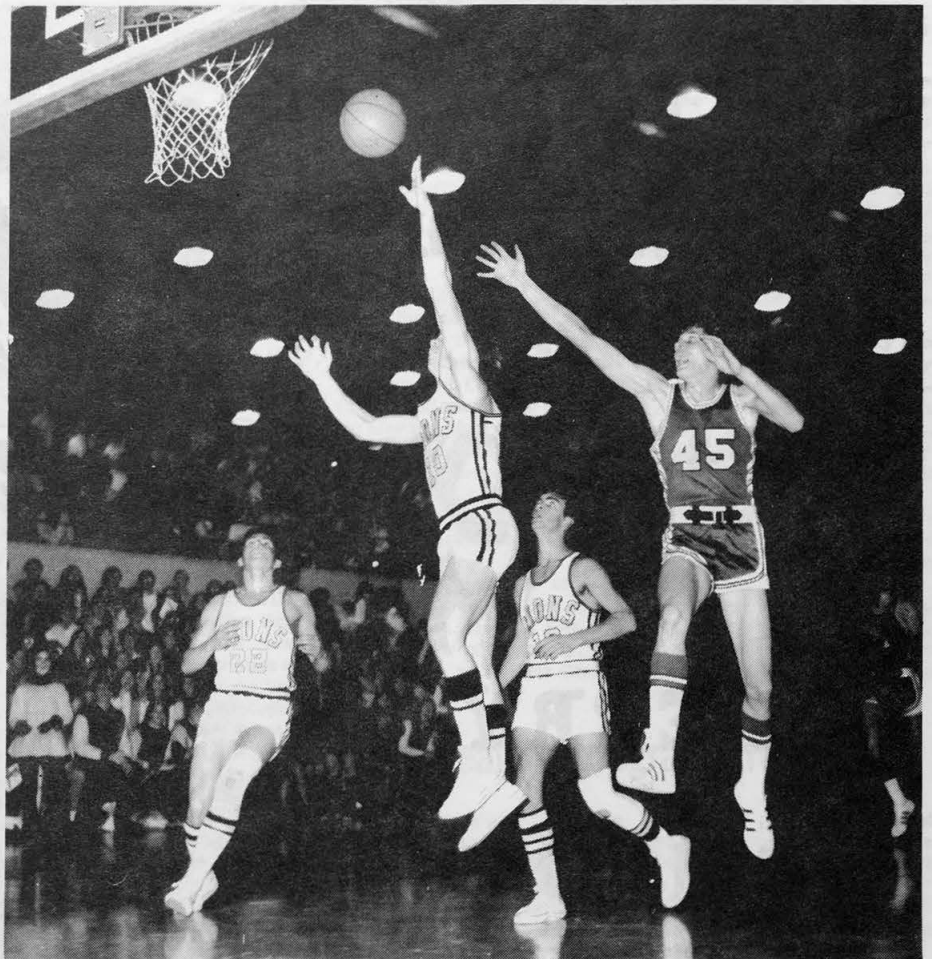
## Lions host RA Long

Chris Knudsen was high scorer with 13 points.

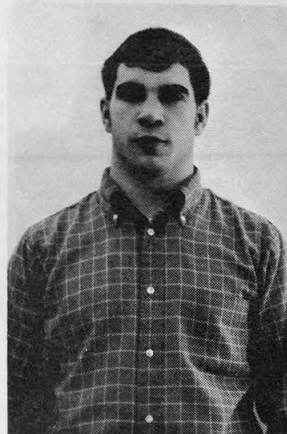
## Soph's fight in first game

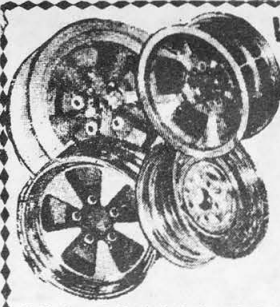
