St. Helens students selected for all Northwest Band

The two were chosen on the merit of a fifteen minute recording of specified material, made by each applicant. The recordings were sent to Ashland, Oregon, where they were judged on a state level. The best recordings were then sent on to Boise for final judging with tapes sent from the other Northwest states, including Washington, Montana, Idaho, and Alaska. Only 200 appli-

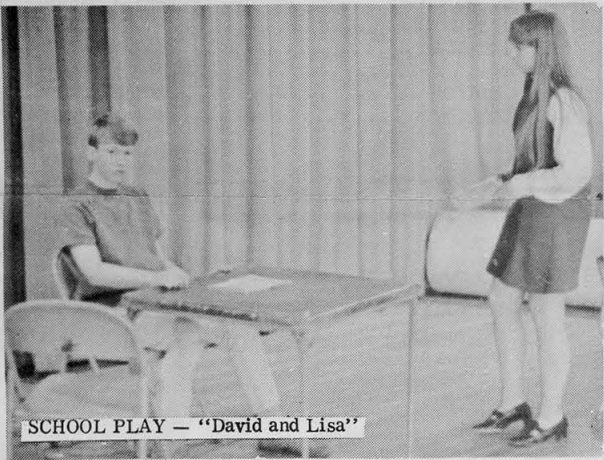
cants pass this final judging and earn a place on the elite band.

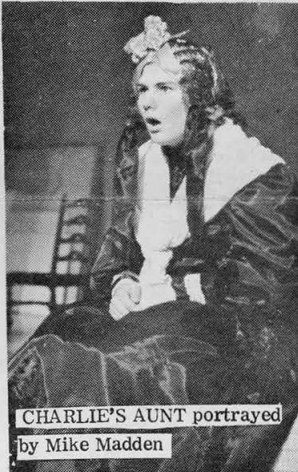
"It's hard for a high school musician to get a greater honor than this," says Mr. Brumbaugh.

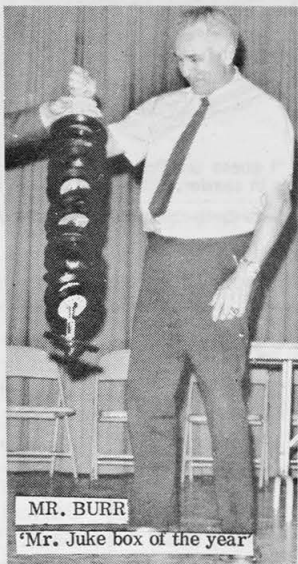

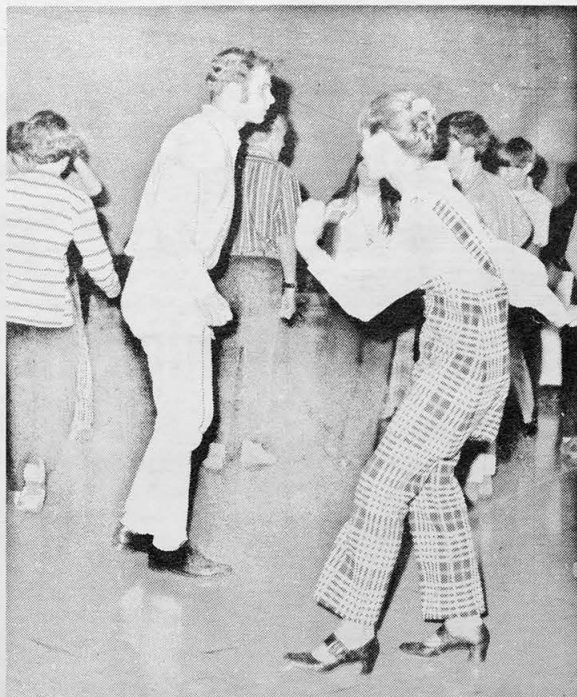

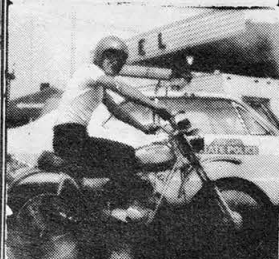

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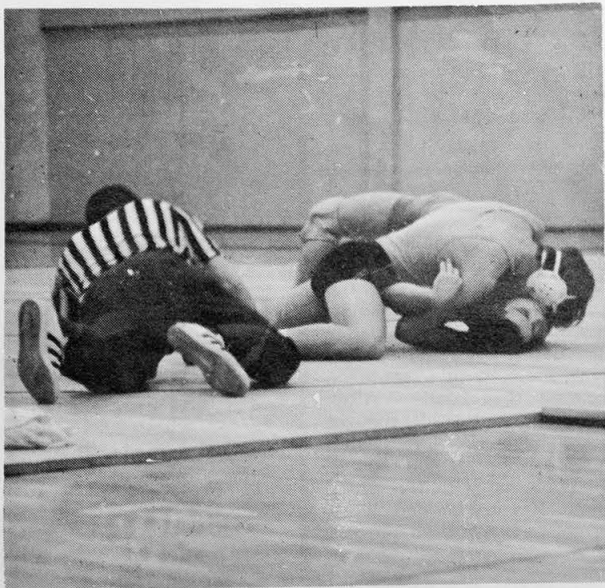

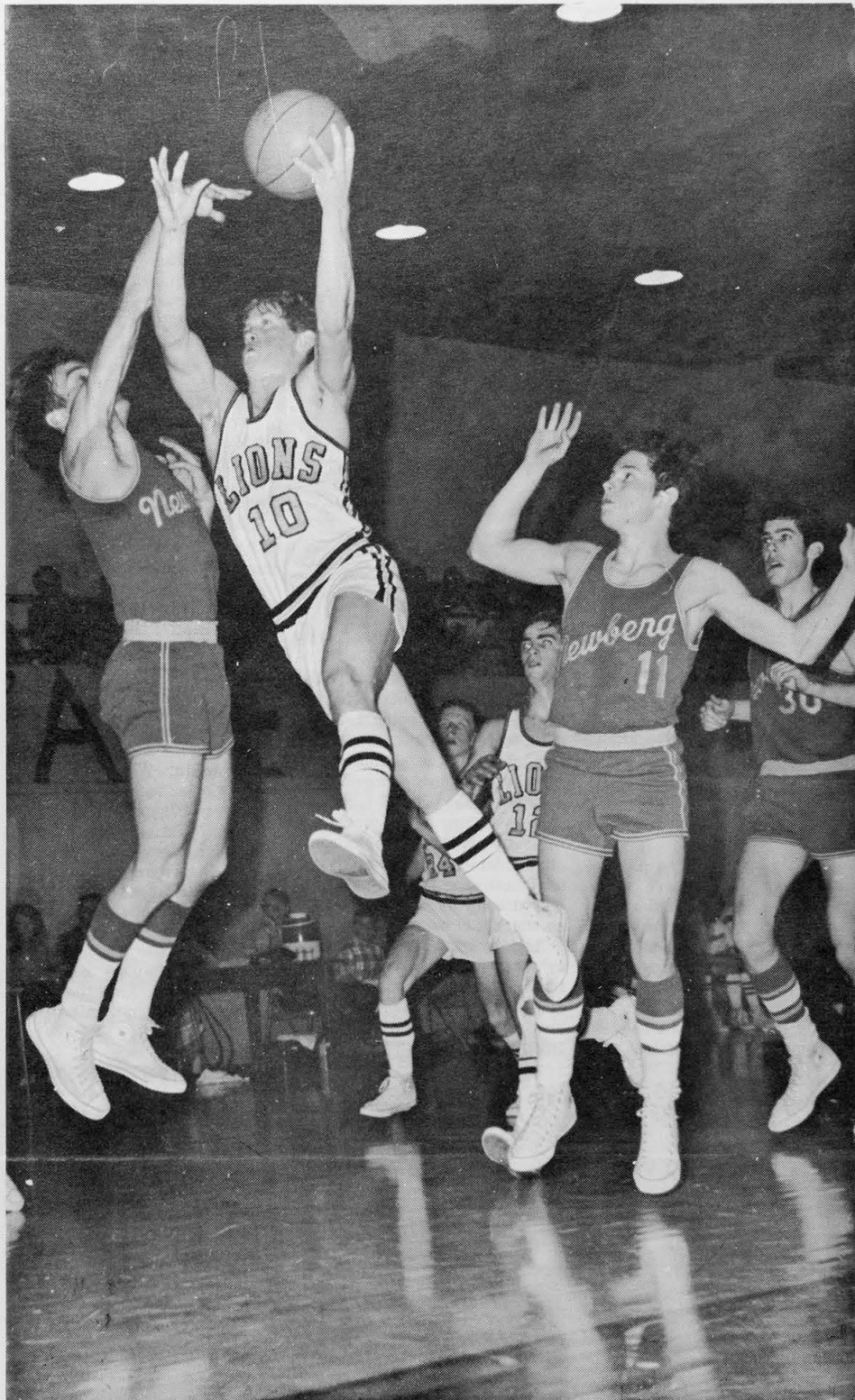
High scorers were Gary Barger-26 and Greg Fisher-9.

St. Helens hosted Newberg Jan. 15 only to lose by a narrow margin 59-51.

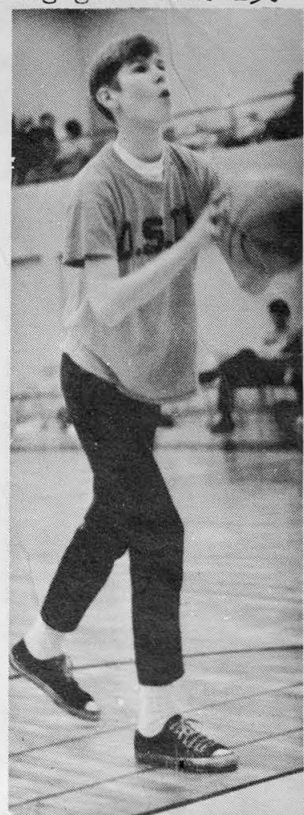
