Joan was selected according to her performance in a written knowledge and aptitude exam, which was taken by 35 local girls, on December 1. The test was open to seniors only. After the test had been taken they were sent in to be evaluated.

The test included questions on world problems, population con-trol, etc., along with homemak-ing questions. Besides the test on general knowledge there was 20 minute essay question on which the girls were judged. Upon being selected, Joan re-

ceived a heart shaped charm with tiny earth on its face, symbolic of the American home. Al-

so, she is now eligible for state or national awards. This includes 102 college scholarships adding up to \$110,000.

Joan has been sewing since the seventh grade when she made her first dress. She now makes formals, wool dresses, suits, and bathing suits. At the present time, Joan, is working on a ve-lour pant suit at home and an Easter dress of orchid taffeta with chiffon overlay, for her class project.

The dates of June 14 to 19 will be important dates to many 4-H club boys and girls throughout Oregon. These are dates of the 56th Annual 4-H Club Summer School at the Oregon State University campus.

Each year during the month of June, a group of Columbia County 4-H Club members spend a week at the 4-H Club Summer School on the campus at Oregon State University. These memattend on scholarships bers provided by organizations, busi-nesses and individuals interested

in the development of youth. During the week the young people explore a wide variety of classes in many fields of study to better prepare them for future career opportunities. Such classes include subjects such as classes include subjects such as leadership, forestry, science, town and country business (exploration of careers related to agricultural business), animal technician, to name a few. In addition to class work, they are offered many opportunities for offered many opportunities for social development through recreation activities, group living in dormitories, leadership train-

ing. For many of the young people it is an experience that helps them to decide to attend a college or university or some other advanced educational institution.

The cost of a scholarship has been increased to \$35.00. The sponsors cost of a scholarship \$30.00. The 4-H member pays \$5.00.

The interest by organization in helping to develop responsible youth has made it possible for Columbia County girls and boys to have this educational ex-perience. Each scholarship of \$35.00 provides tuition, room and board for the six-day session. Selection of delegates is made by the scholarship committee of the Columbia County 4-H Leaders Association. 4-H club members 13 years or over are eligible to apply for a scholarship.

Any organization may provide a scholarship by returning the enclosed form and a check in the amount of \$30.00 for each scholarship. Checks should be made payable to the Columbia County Extension Service and may be sent to the Columbia County Ex-tension Office, Courthouse, St. Helens, by March 15.
