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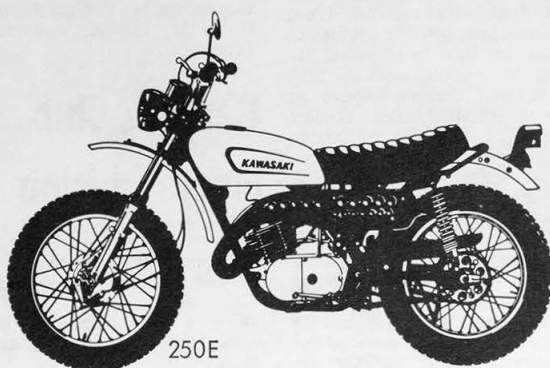
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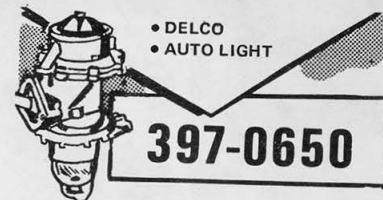

Ten games will be played, one of David Douglass' players against two of ours. Mr. Clark commented that "this tournament will be a good experience for the players even if they don't win."

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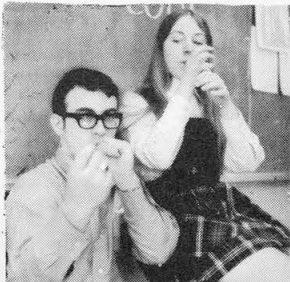

Pictured above are Linda Coleman and Jim Linhares chosen as the cutest couple of the senior class.



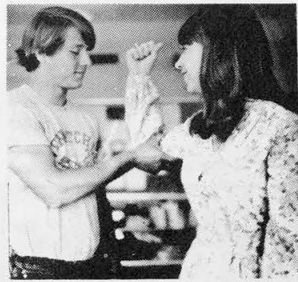
Pictured above are Donna Ross and Paul Nelson chosen for their traits of intelligence. They're the couple most likely to succeed.

Pictured at the left is the couple chosen as the most talented of the senior class. They are Shelley Bates and Tim Minikel.

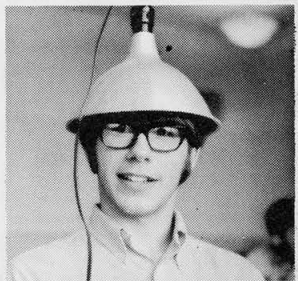


The best figure and physique of the senior class belong to Pam Adkins and Gary Cooper. They are pictured at the right.



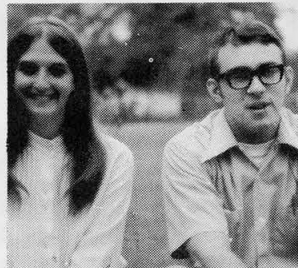
Sally Tustan was chosen as the most beautiful girl of the senior class, her handsome partner is Ron Wagner. They are pictured at the left.

The most athletic couple of the senior class is pictured at the right. They are Carol Pickering and Stan Mendenhall.



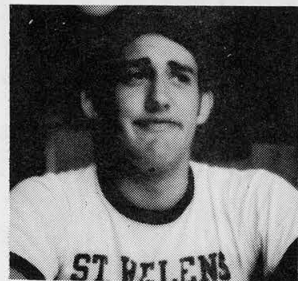
Chosen for their school spirit for the most spirited couple of the senior class are Bev Johnson and Gordan McWhirter pictured at the left.

For their friendly smiles and personalities Sherry Elder and Tim Minikel were chosen as the most friendly couple of their class. Pictured at the right.



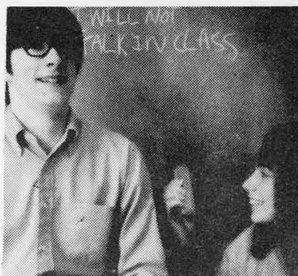
The most humorous couple to be found in the senior class is Laurie Fenk and Terry Kjornes. Pictured at the left.

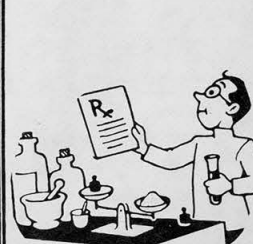
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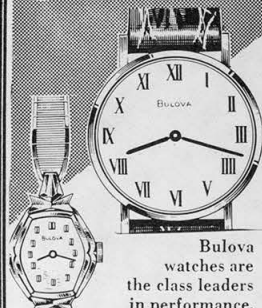
