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

A revised version of "Everything is Beautiful" was the marching song chosen for the winning junior class. Students participating were attired in dress clothes, they marched in



DRUG SURVEY

In order to establish a clearer image of the drug scene at SHSHS, a questionnaire polling the student opinion was administered Dec. 9, 1971. The questionnaire was intended to be a voluntary action in which a student using his own justification could either fill out the form or turn it in blank. Surprisingly enough, out of the complete student body, consisting of 611 people, 521 forms were turned in with only 2% of those left black. left blank.

The results of the poll are as follows:

1. Have you ever experimented with marijuana? yes — 22%, no — 72%, maybe — 4%, and don't - 6%

2. If no, would you ever try it? yes — 7%, no — 79%, maybe — 11%, and don't know — 3%

3. Do you feel it was easier to get with an open campus - 28%, closed campus — 20% and no difference — 52%.

4. Is marijuana easy to get here

at school? yes -30%, no -11% maybe -12%, and don't know -12%

47%.
5. If marijuana was legalized, would you use it? yes — 62%, no — 19%, maybe — 9%, and don't

6. Do you feel marijuana is harmful — 58%, Harmless — 24% -58%, Harmless — 24% and don't know - 18%.

Do you think marijuana should be legalized? yes — 23%, no — 56%, don't know — 15%, and maybe — 6%.

8. Do you feel pushers should be turned in? marijuana pushers: yes — 72%, no — 20%, maybe — 4% and don't know — 4%.

Hard drug pushers: yes — 91%, no — 5%, maybe — 3%, and don't know — 1%.

9. Do you see any difference between hard drug users and marijuana users? yes — 62%, no — 21%, maybe — 4%, and don't - 13%

10. Have you ever tried a hard drug? yes — 7%, no — 90%, maybe — 1%, and don't know —

11. Would you ever try one (to the best of your knowledge)?

6%, no — 83%, maybe — 4%, and don't know — 7%.

12. Do you feel the drug program here at school is adequate? yes — 21%, no — 40%, maybe — 27%, and don't know — 12%.

13. Has the drug program helped you in making any decisions about the use of drugs? yes -54%, no -28%, maybe 8%, and don't know -13%.

14. Do you feel that the drug program needs improvement? yes — 58%, no — 13%, maybe — 7%, and don't know — 22%.

15. Do you think there is a drug problem here at SHSHS? yes — 45%, no — 18%, maybe — 17%, 45%, no — 18%, maybe — 17%, and don't know — 20%.

16. If your answer to question 15

was yes, do you feel the problem has increased or decreased

The one comment dealing with question 4 which the majority held in common was, "It doesn't matter because if someone wants it, they'll get it whether the campus is open or closed. In fact, 52% of the students said it makes no difference as to a closed or open campus in the marijuana

Question 5, if marijuana was made legal would you use it? Here are two examples which are "ves. but also held in common: not as a habit, because I believe it is an escape just as alcohol is for some people. Once in a while is fine for kicks, but you can become mentally addicted just like cigarettes.

"In my opinion, I would rather smoke dope than drink. I feel its

Breakage of chromosomes and brain damage was cited as possible harmful affects of marijuana whereas marijuana does not lead to disease, hardening of the arteries and liver as drinking does. Many students stayed in different by commenting, "Nobody has come up with anything yet saying it was harmful or harmless

Should Marijuana legalized? Here are two views of people who have smoked marijuana and said yes, they would use it if it were legal, but answered, "No, it should not be legalized: "People would take advantage of it and I do believe it can change the views of a person very much and I like to hear what someone's real opinion is of something.

"Well we really don't need anymore stuff for people to use as crutches, but if it were legalized it would probably make arrests go down.

Fifty-eight percent of the students felt that the drug program needed improvement, but yet most could not offer any suggestions as to why or how it might be improved. There were some students unaware of the program, as it is not offered as a class but only part of the health study in PE and Social Studies.

A few suggestion for improve ment were more films, facts, and discussions on the topic, or possibly, a person already ex-perienced with drugs giving a talk on drugs since some students feel he would be more qualified to speak.

To summarize, the poll has revealed a picture, first of all, that marijuana is not known to be easy to obtain at school. Moreover, it makes no difference as to open or closed campus. Secondly, over half of the students feel that marijuana should not be legalized but two thirds would use it if it were. there is a drug problem which apparently has increased in the last two yars.


