New bleachers proposed on school ballot

The construction of a new covered grandstand at SHSHS will be placed on the May school election ballot. There will be a special one year tax levy of \$149,000 for this purpose, Zan Freeburn, SHSHS principal, explained.

After considerable searching throughout the Northwest undertaken by Mr. Freeburn and Andrew Knudsen, athletic director, a grandstand design similar to that in Battleground, Washington was selected. The

grandstand would be of concrete construction, with a wooden cantilever roof. The roof is so designed that there would be no roof posts to obstruct the spectator vision. The grandstand would seat 1,500 people.

For the past two years, the present grandstand has been in need of extensive repair. Between the span of 1970-71, dry rot has been noted in the joints of the grandstand and work would have had to be done in order to make the old grandstand serviceable

for the coming football season.

As the present grandstand has been in use for the past 14 years, Mr. Freeburn explains, the deterioration is an increasing problem and major overhaul is not feasible because of the dry rot in the joints.

If the levy is approved on the May 1 ballot, construction of the new grandstand would begin June 1, 1972 and proceed until completion in September 1972.

Two advantages of the new grandstand are a minimal

maintenance cost and a reduction in the insurance premium. Moreover, since the new grandstand would be built in 15 foot sections, there would be flexible room to increase the size.

The plan is for restrooms and concessions to be located beneath the seating area. The remaining area beneath the seats would be used for storage of equipment for the athletic department and other school district equipment and machinery. This storage area is guaranteed to be air tight and

water proof.

Mr. Freeburn said also that after completion the new grandstands could be used for other field sports and even for future outdoor graduation services. Since the gymnasium is becoming increasingly crowded, it has been necessary to limit the number of friends and relatives who may attend graduation and overheating has also been a problem in the past. Both problems could be eliminated with covered stands.

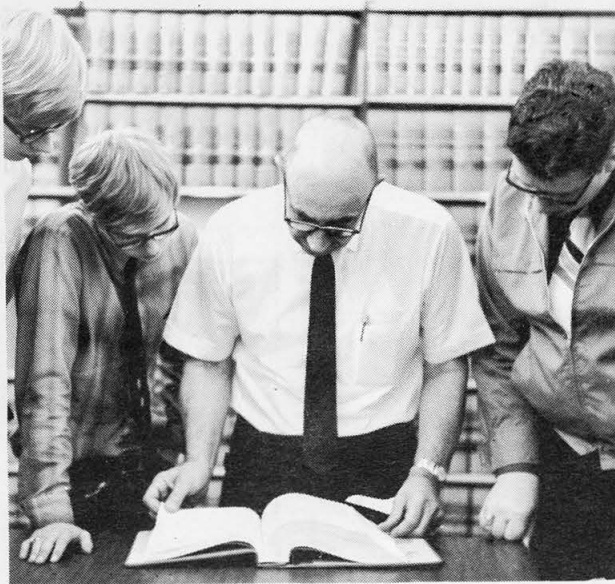
DO 1 experiments

New dates to register

High School seniors who plan to take advantage of the new July registration program at the University of Oregon must complete admission and make reservations by June 15.

By completing admission requirements before June 15, students will be able to participate in one of the six July dates scheduled for registration-orientation.

They can go through the entire registration process on July 14, 17, 21, 24, 28, or 31 and escape the rush of the regular Fall Term registration. Another advantage is that, being pre-registered, they won't have to arrive on the University campus for Fall term until the day before classes start September 25.

The July programs have been planned as an unhurried time for students to become acquainted with course offerings, to receive individualized academic advising, to meet with faculty, and then to register. If they wish, they may also pay their fees at that time.

In conjunction with the program for freshman students, a special schedule of events has been planned for parents. This program is designed to enable parents to become acquainted with University personnel, gain familiarity with academic programs and University services, and to obtain specific information about the many aspects of student life.

Entering freshmen who want to come to the campus the night before the July date they select will have the opportunity of spending the night in a University dormitory. Arrangements for this must be made in advance.

Complete information on the events of the July registration-orientation program and advance registration forms will be sent with the Statement Admissions to all entering freshmen.

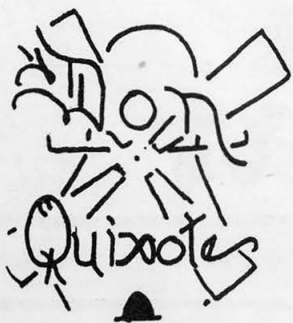

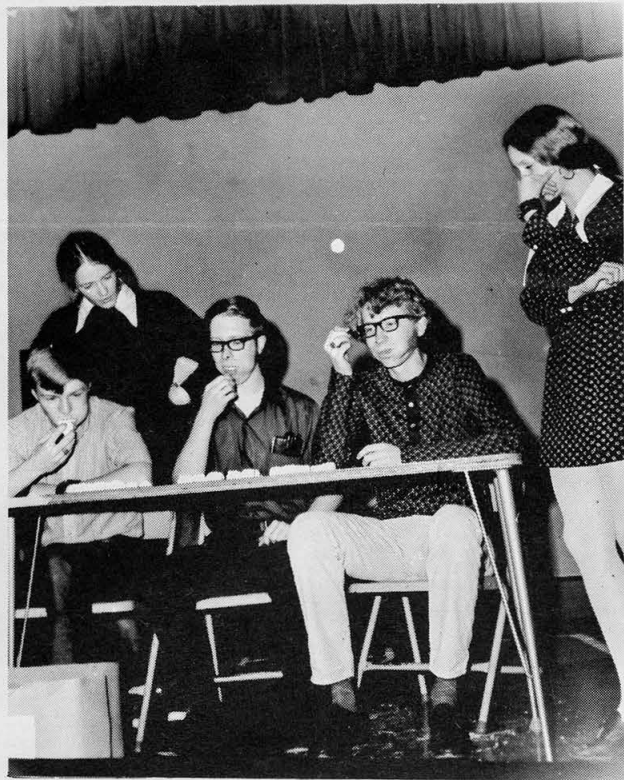
The first stop on the trip was Pixie Land. Almost all of the park was closed except for the penny arcade where students played the game machines the park had to offer.

As a junior Barb is studying Introductory Analysis, English, Choir, U.S. History, Chemistry, and German. She is also active in Girls League and German Club.

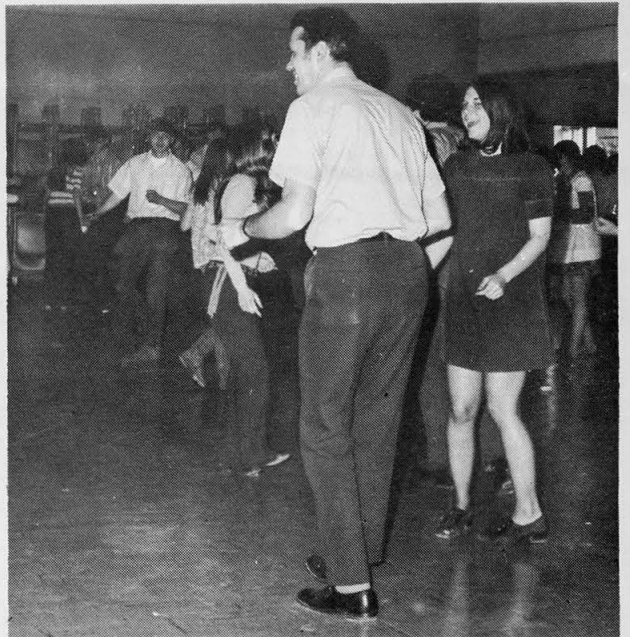

Some of the Lion track stars competed in a pre-season all-comers meet held at Mt. Hood Community College. Most of those entering did quite well.

In running the two mile, Gary Barger set a new school record, covering the distance in a time of 9:20.8.

Dave Nickelson was first in the mile with a time of 4:24. Sophomore Ralph Painter was third in that race with a time of 4:30.

Jim Beck broke the two minute barrier in his second place finish in the 880. His time was 159.5.

A new addition to the track team is Doug Norman. He gained a third place finish in the 440 with a time of 53.7.

John Heller took first in both the low and high hurdles. Heller's 5'8" high jump earned him a second place award in that event.

Jerry Fast placed second behind Rick Eatmon in the 100 yard dash. Bo's time was 10.1 — he can do better.

John Stermer was second in the long jump with a jump of 19'7". Weight man Mark Rowland threw the Discus 142'9" for a third place finish.

Jefferson was most notably strong in the sprint events, winning the 100 yd. dash, 220 yd. dash, the low hurdles and the 440 relay. The St. Helens team of Durbin, Fast, Norman, and Barger won the mile relay.
