PCC to televise college credit series

Portland Community College will join with Portland's KPTV will join with Portland's KPTV (Channel 12) to televise a 15-week college credit course entitled "Man and Environment" to be offered Monday and Tuesday at 10:30 p.m. and Tuesday and Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. The series will begin January 22. In addition to the Portland metropolitan area, KPTV is carried by sixtyone cable television companies throughout Oregon and Washington, and people living in any area are eligible to enroll. In line with PCC's "open door" philosophy, there are no prerequisites; a high school diploma is not necessary to receive credit.

The first Oregon community college to offer a one-semester course on commercial television, Portland Community College will award three transfer credits in anthropology for successful com-(Channel 12) to televise a 15-week

award three transfer credits in anthropology for successful com-pletion of the course. Students will enroll by mail to PCC's Community Education Division. They

will be mailed materials, textbo will be mailed learning materials, textbooks, and examinations. A telephone "hotline" service enabling students to discuss problems with in-structors will be provided.

The first half hour of each week will be a color, sound film produced by the Miami-Dade T.V. duced by the Miami-Dade 1.v. College in Miami, Florida high-lighting a specific environmental problem. Topics include: "Environmental Imperatives," "Nature of Man," "Air Pollution," "Water: Supply, Demand, Pollution," "Population Pollution, " "Population Pollution," "Individual Involve-Dynamics," "Individual Involve-ment," "Urbanization," and others. The second half-hour will be a panel discussion of the pros and cons of each issue, bringing into focus specific local prob-lems. Each panel member will be an expert in his or her field.

The mid-term and final examinations will be mailed to PCC and grades will be awarded on the basis of test performance.

Geraldine Pearson, ordinator of Special Projects, sees the program as an excellent way for high school students to take a college course in their own living room, as a potential in-service program for teachers, and as an entertaining and informative program for people who may wish to tune-in without taking the course for credit. KPTV's Program Manager Gordon White is an enthusiastic

Gordon White is an enthusiastic supporter of public service and education programs on com-mercial television. White says, We have a responsibility to prowe have a responsibility to provide the type of programming that people in the Northwest want. We are delighted to be cooperating with PCC in this pro-



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
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LEN MASON (No. 40) goes up for a lay-in over a Forest Grove defender

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
