Carol Contest highlights Christmas season

The "Class of 74", lead by Steven Coy and accompanied by Miriam Nolte, was the winning class of the 1972 Carol Contest, sponsored by Girl's League.

The competition song was "We Three Kings" and the junior class chose as their marching song, "We'd Like to Teach the World to Sing", with different lyrics added to fit the theme of the Carol Contest. Long dresses and shirts and ties were worn and for the first time in any Carol Contest a backdrop with revolving panels was featured.

The sophomore class chose as their marching song "Here Comes Santa Claus," with Santa and reindeer coming in to highlight the end of their song. They were lead by Cathy Carpenter and their accompanist was Julie Eaton. The sophomores chose to wear short dresses with shirts and ties for the guys.

The defending "71" Carol Contest winners, the class of '73 was lead by Dave Lawrence and they were accompanied by Twana Bates. They chose to wear short dresses and suits while marching in to a medley of "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" and "Angels We Have Heard On High."

The judges for the contest were Sister Marian from St. Frederic; Mrs. Joyce Phillips, former leader of the Sweet Adelines; and Rev. Ernest Mathes from the First Christian Church. The

judges were chosen by the Girls League and had to meet two basic requirements. They were to have no direct affiliation with St. Helens Senior High School and they were to be people who understand and know about music.

The classes were judged on four basic things first being, initiative, which counted for 50% of the total, and under this heading was appearance, marching, presentation of the song, and the backdrop. 10% was based on the ability of the class and the accompanist to keep with the leader, while 5% was based on class participation. The quality of singing counted 35%, and special consideration was given to the size of the class and their past experience.

The program was presented by the Girls League. Trudy Glasscoe first introduced the judges and then she introduced the classes for competition.

Barb Hall, program chairman, introduced Sheree Bogardus who narrated the program. The program included scenes the Chamber Singers might have encountered during a tour throughout the U.S.

The first scene was at a home where the tree was being decorated while the Chamber Singers sang "We'll Dress the House," this scene included Rosemary Dahlgren as the mother, Charles Mueleck as the

father and Clarinda Hanson as the little girl.

Next they moved on to some old peoples home where Chris Iversen as George and Rhonda Dawson as Martha, wished for their children to be with them, while the French and German students sang "Silent Night."

Then we witnessed a kindergarten class room where the teacher asked the question, "What do you think of Christmas?" The Chamber Singers next sang "Angels We Have Heard On High."

They also encountered a scene at the White House, where Dick was writing a letter to Santa, and Pat was doing her best to help him. The Chamber Singers sang "O Come All Ye Faithful."

And their last stop was at a poor house where the children were anxiously waiting for their father to get home so they could give him the small present they had got him for Christmas, even though they knew he would not have enough money to buy them all presents this year.

The Chamber Singers lead the Student Body in some carols while the judges were making the final decision on the winning class.

Rev. Mathes then asked for the leaders of each class to come forward and he presented the carol contest plaque to Steve Coy, Song Leader for the junior class.



The '64 blue and mud brown Corvair Monza is the special car in the SHSHS parking lot that I chose for this issue of Kar Korner (or maybe it should be Kar Muddy Kruddy Korner?) Dave Lawrence, the proud owner of this little mud bug claims to sport a stock six with three mighty (?) cylinders on each side, 194 cubic inch (let's see, that's a whole 97 inches on each side, WOW!), there is a separate carburetor for each bank with the carbs basically producing 110 horsepower total.

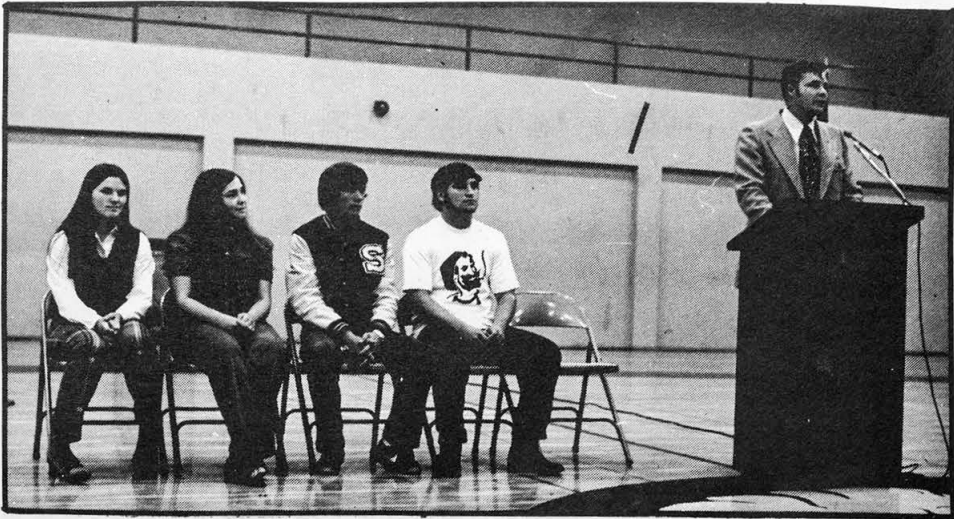

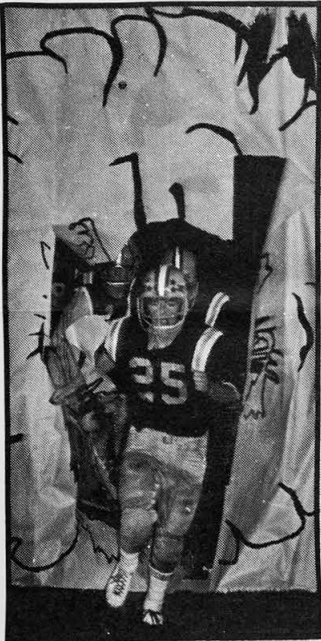

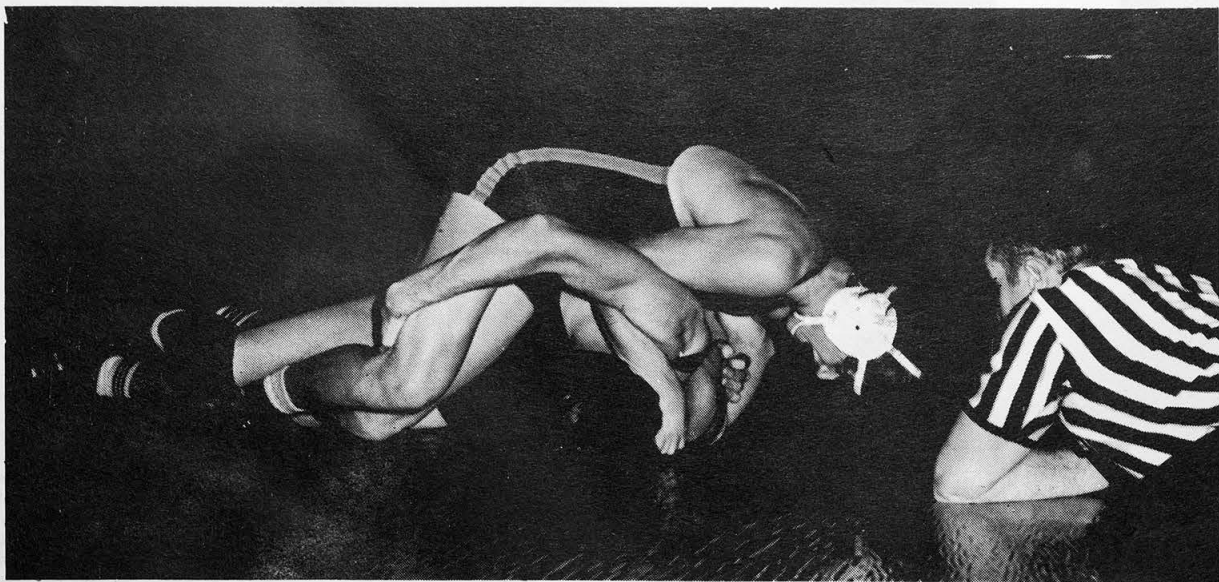

Wrestlers victorious twice lose one

It proved to be a senior Saturday on Dec. 16 as the St. Helens varsity wrestlers stomped over Rogue River by a team score of 48 to 17. It proved to be a day for the seniors when 6 out of 7 of them got pins.

The first wrestler for the Lions was Jim Welch who lost by a decision, and Randy Doris 115 lost by a decision the score at that time was 11-0 in favor of the Chieftains. The next St. Helens grappler was John Schmidt a senior at 123 was considered to be the one who started it off, Schmidt pinned his man at 1:09 of the first period. Rocky Thurman 130 pinned his man at 43 seconds of the third period. Mike Coddington 136 pounds pinned his man at 1:06 of the first period. The score at that point was 18-11 in favor of the Lions. The next match at 141 pounds, Kurt Sigler lost by a decision in the closing seconds. Roy Oliver started it off again as he pinned his man at 1:10 seconds of the second round. At 157 pounds Randy VonAllmen played around with his man but finally put him down for the pin at 1:06 of the second round. The final senior to pin his man was Bob Davis at 168 pounds trying desperately to pin his man and finally did so at

1:09 of the third round. The score now read 36-14 St. Helens. At 178 pounds Mike Thomas pinned his man at 1:13 of the first round. Jerry Thomas 191 pounds lost by a close decision and Dave DePriest at Heavyweight won by a forfeit.

The second varsity also had a fine day out on the mats as they ran over Rouge River's second varsity by a score of 45-18.

At 98 pounds Gerraed Pritchett lost by a pin. Both teams forfeited 106 pounds, and at 115 Pat Kearsley won by a pin which he got at 1:19 of the second period. Mark Nelson 123 pounds won by a pin at 1:06 of the 3 round. At the 130 pound class Kelly Dering lost by a pin, at that point the score was 12-12. Frank Heppner 136 pounds won by a pin at 52 seconds of the second round. At 140 pounds Dave Hanson won by a decision and the score after that was 21-18 in favor of the Lions. Rich Bailly 157, Scott Manges 168, Rick Luttrell 178, and Larry Cave 191 all won by forfeits and the final match both teams forfeited heavyweight.

The St. Helens wrestlers made it two wins in a row as they again stomped their opponent, this time it was the John Adams Patriots

and the final varsity score was 50 to 12.

The varsity started off good as 98 pounder Jim Welch won by a forfeit, but the next weight class, 106, St. Helens ended up forfeiting it as the wrestler wasn't able to make weight. At 115 pounds Pat Kearsley won by a decision, and at that point in the match it was 9 to 6 in favor of the Lions. The next match John Schmidt 123, won by forfeit. 130 pound wrestler Rocky Thurman won by forfeit also. Mike Coddington at 136 pounds won by a decision 2-1. The 141 pound wrestler Brian Sigler lost by a decision. Roy Oliver 148 won by a decision, 137 pounder Randy VonAllman won by a forfeit. At 168 pounds Bob Davis won by a decision and Mike Thomas also winning by decision. Gerry Thomas 191 pounds won by a forfeit, and a heavyweight Dave DePriest drew at 0-0.

The second varsity also had a good night as they downed their opponents by a score of 78-0. But the only wrestlers to wrestle on second varsity were Frank Heppner in which he won by a pin, and Larry Cave, which pinned his man also, all other weights were forfeited by Adams.

The varsity wrestlers lost their

first match Thursday, Dec. 21 to the Sandy Pioneers by a close score of 22 to 26.

At 98 pounds Jim Welch lost by a decision, and Kevin Muller lost by decision at 106. It was the third match before St. Helens got any points on the board as Pat Kearsley pinned his opponent in the second round. At 123 pounds John Schmidt won by a decision, but the next three wrestlers all lost by a decision, Rocky Thurman (130), Mike Coddington (136) and Tim Coddington (141) pounds. Roy Oliver at 148 and Randy VonAllmen 157, won their matches by decisions and at that point the match was almost even. The next three wrestlers, Bob Davis (168), Mike Thomas (178) and Gerry Thomas (191) all lost by decisions, and the final match, heavyweight, Dave DePriest won by a pin in the first round.

The second varsity also lost their match by a score of 24-36.

Wrestlers winning by pins were Randy Doris (115), Mark Nelson (123), Frank Heppner (136), and Larry Cave won by a forfeit. The Lions had three wrestlers that tied, they were Dave Hanson 148, tying 6-6, Jim Fischer 157, tying 9-9, and Rick Luttrell 178 tying 3-3.

The St. Helens varsity basketball team opened their league play Monday night December 18 with a victory over the Central Panthers by a score of 70 to 56.

The Lions looked like they wanted to win the game as they went out from the very beginning and clearly dominated the first, second, and third quarters.

The leading scorer for the St. Helens Lions was Bruce Kneeland with 14 points, he was also the leading rebounder with 11. Next to Kneeland was Len Mason with 13 points he also trailed behind Kneeland with seven rebounds. The rest of the scores were as follows — Marc Knudson ten points — and one rebound, Jeff Heller nine points, five re-
