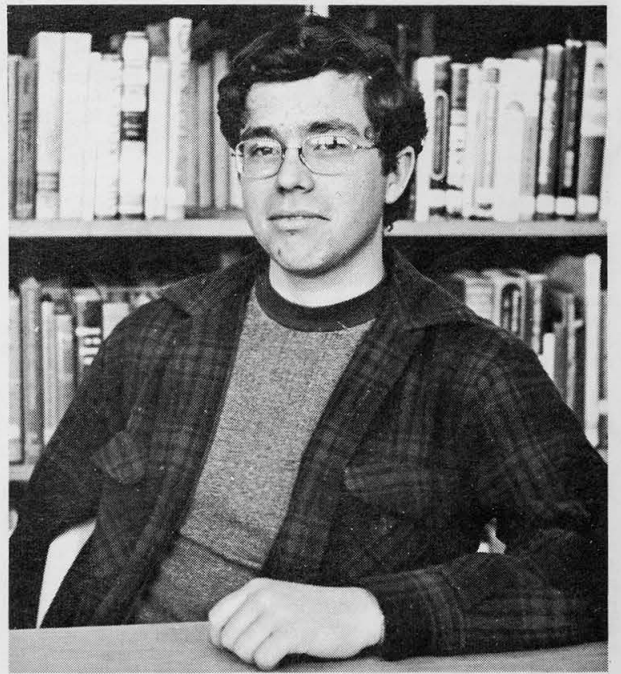
Top students announced

Choir travels to Estacada

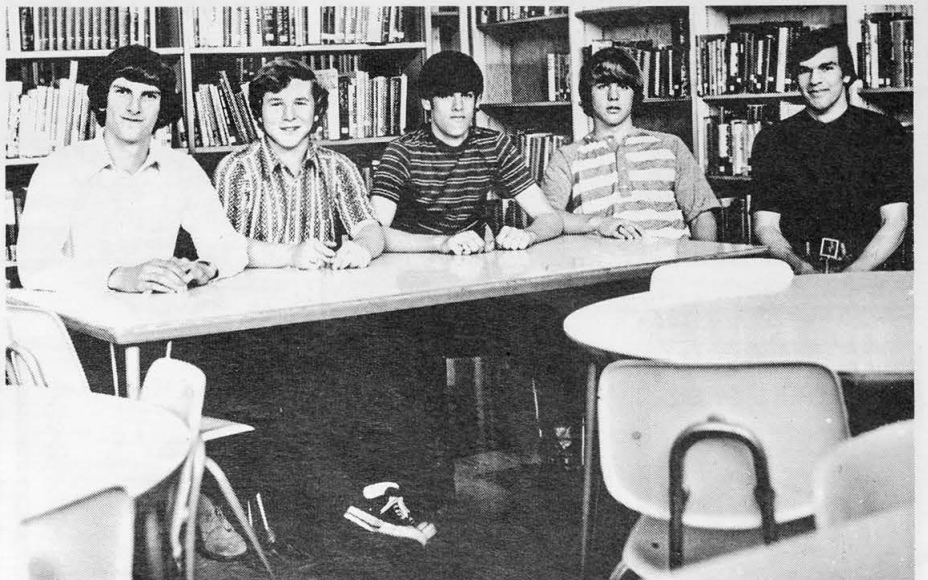
The SHSHS concert choir traveled to Estacada for the annual Coast-Valley League Choir Festival.

There may be a few lucky ones . . . but not many.

Recently some prisoners of war from Viet Nam returned and an article was printed in the April 9 issue of TIME magazine. The following is a portion of that article . . . "Air Force Lieut. Colonel John Dramesi began in the fall of 1971 to laboriously stitch together an American Flag. He used the threads from a yellow blanket for the gold embroidery, pieces of red nylon underwear and red thread from a handkerchief, white threads from a towel and patches of blue from a North Vietnamese jacket. The flag often flew at night in the Hanoi Hilton cell block that she shared with 40 other men, and it was dutifully saluted. 'I thought that a flag could be a symbol to which we could attach ourselves, so that we could retain our honor and respect,' says Dramesi. Such exercises in symbolism proved immensely valuable in sustaining morale."

If our country is involved in another all out war, how many of our citizens will be willing to fight for our country and how many will show courage and love for

the U.S. Flag enough to make a replica of the flag of our nation as this young man did?

People of America, stop and think about the last time you saw our flag, it was probably used as a patch on someones old jeans or maybe it was a group of anti-war protestors in a court yard some place burning the flag. What about the beautiful patriotic songs that are now sung by just a few on very special occasions, if you can't remember them then maybe it's time we did something about having a little patriotism in our schools, churches and community organizations and functions.

Next time you hear or say "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all", you should feel some kind of sentiment toward your God and your nation, the free country in which you are living and if you don't then maybe you should do what the bumper sticker says "AMERICA, LOVE IT OR LEAVE IT!"

New Basketball coach named

Tom Stewart, a 1969 graduate of Utah State University and three years a varsity basketball letterman at that school, has been named new head basketball coach at St. Helens Senior High.

Stewart was chosen from a list of approximately 30 candidates who had sought the position. The new coach fills the vacancy created when Chuck Whittick resigned the head coaching position at the close of the recent cage season.

Stewart was an assistant coach at Utah State during the 1968-69 basketball season, working with the Frosh squad, and the following three years was head coach at Boistfort High School in Curtis, Wash. During his three years at Boistfort High, two of his teams were district tourney entrants. His high school teams had a 30-win 30-loss record.

While attending high school in Piedmont, Calif., Stewart earned three varsity letters as a 6-5, 175-pound center.

He was a regular varsity center while attending Santa Rosa

Junior College during the 1964-65 season, a team that won the league title, and in post-season play earned consolation honors in the State JC Tournament.

He earned individual honors at Santa Rosa JC in being chosen on the all-league first team, and was the league's leading scorer, averaging 26 points a game. He was named the most valuable player in the Golden Valley Conference and was a first team all-tourney choice in the GVC tournament.

He was also a first team choice in the California State Junior College tournament, the All-Northern California Junior College tourney, and the All-State California JC tournament.

During Stewart's three years at Utah State, he played in the Far West Classic in Portland as a sophomore in 1966, and in the National Invitational Tournament at Madison Square Garden in his '66-'67 year. As team captain during the 1967-68 season, he earned the most improved player award.

Because centers in major colleges usually tower above Stewart's 6-6 height, he played as a guard or forward while attending Utah State.

Stewart spent five summers as a staff member of LaDell Andersen's Basketball Camp at Logan, Utah. Andersen was head basketball coach at Utah State while Stewart was in school, and since has been head coach of the professional Utah Stars in the American Basketball Association.

Besides Stewart's head basketball coaching assignment, he will be a physical education instructor at the school, and will assist in other sports. He was a PE and social studies instructor at Boistfort.

He and his wife, Kathleen, also a teacher, plan to move to St. Helens as soon as housing is available. He plans to spend part of the summer in summer school, and devote as much time as possible to working with local youngsters in athletic programs.

Trackmen win three in a row

McMinnville fell prey to the Lions April 9 as St. Helens pulled out a 94-51 win over the Grizzlies.

St. Helens picked up twelve of the seventeen first places, nine seconds, and seven thirds in their win. Picking up firsts in more than one event were Gary Hallaian, Jim Beck, Terry Charlet, Don Beckwith, and Steve Huit.

Gary Kling placed first in the javelin with a throw of 157'11. At second was Rick Burgoyne with 149'1.

In the high jump Mike Duman placed second behind Steve Huit of Mac.

McMinnville picked up a first and second in the mile run and St. Helens runner Chuck Muehleck placed at third behind them.

Dave Stroud set a new school record in the high jump as he cleared 12'6. He erased the old mark of 12'0.

St. Helens picked up a first and second in the triple jump with Ron Hamilton at first and Jeff Edwards at second.

10.4 was the time that it took Gary Hallaian to run the 100 yd. dash. Mac took second and third in the event.

In the 440 yd. dash Jim Beck placed first in a 53.6 time. Behind him at second was Brian Sigler and in third was Klingler of Mac.

Randy Peterson and Jeff Edwards took second and third in the high hurdles for St. Helens. They placed behind Bruce Griffith of McMinnville.

Terry Charlet and Mike Peterson captured first and second for the Lions in the discus.

In the shot put it was again Charlet and Peterson as they placed first and second respectively.

Beckwith picked up a first in the 880 yd. run and behind him at second was Marc Knudsen, and Rick Kling at third.

Gary Hallaian's second win of the night came in the 220 yd. dash at 23.0. Dave Stroud placed third with 25.0.

Jeff Edwards picked up a first in the intermediate hurdles at 44.6. Behind him at second and third were two Mac runners.

St. Helens placed first and third in the 2 mile run. Placing first was Jim Beck and third was Joe McGilvra.

The JV's also picked up a win from the Grizzlies as they rolled up a 59-30 score. Picking up first places were the 440 relay team (composed of Peterson, Sigler, Duman, and Mallory); Tim Waine in the javelin; Mark Mallory in the 100; Kevin Kent in the pole vault; Ron Hamilton in the 220 yd. run and the mile relay team (Muehleck, Kling, Mallory, and Duman).
