Spring play claimed smash success

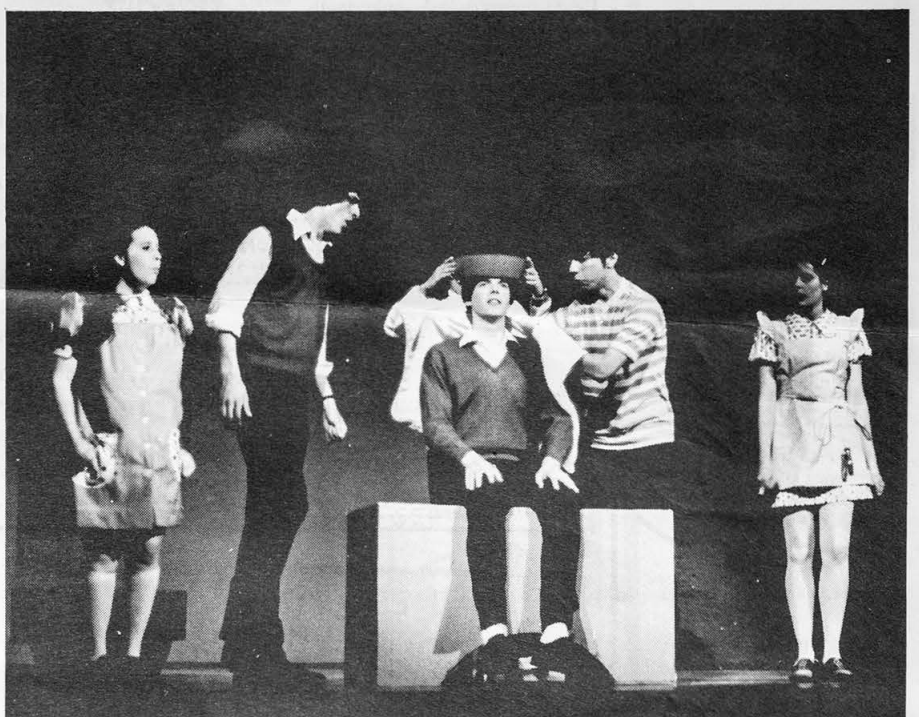

The next activity was sitting in
on a DEQ hearing. Everyone then
climbed seven flights of stairs to
listen in on a House of Repre-
sentatives session. During the
session, the students were able to
see how bills are passed because
there was actually a bill about
Veterans Day passed on the floor.
All of the members of the class
got there pictures taken on the

front steps of the capital building
by Mr. Easterly. The next stop
was Champog park where they
ate lunch and then went back to
school.
Mrs. Stewarts' and Miss Lar-
son's classes went on Monday.
There they saw basically the
same things as the previous
classes. In Governor McCall's
office, however, a tour guide told
the students about the table in the
entry way which had a picture of
the original capital building and
another table which had a sample
of moon rock. She also gave the

Senate session instead of a House
session. There they listened to the
Senators vote on a rent bill.
Senator Holmstrom and Rep.
Magruder also spoke to them.
They returned to the buses but
before going to Champog Park,
they stopped at a supermarket to
buy pop for Mrs. Stewart's
classes. At the park, Bambi Bér-
dahl and Terri Nickelson were
photographed hanging in a tree

DO students honor employers

The St. Helens Senior High School Diversified Occupation (work experience) students honored their local employers with a banquet at the St. Helens Golf Course Clubhouse, Monday, April 30, 1973 at 7:00 p.m.

Featured speaker was Dr. Richard Schmidt, Consultant, Program Planning, Career Education, Oregon State Department of Education. Dr. Schmidt is a former St. Helens resident and helped initiate the local as well as the Vernonia, Scappoose and Rainier high school work experience programs. He is presently assisting School Districts throughout the state in planning coordinated career education programs from elementary through senior high school.

This year there were 26 individual employers providing jobs for 35 students in such occupations as welding, horse trainer, nurse' aid, bookkeeper, tire service man, data processing operator and grocery store clerks.

This, the end of the seventh year of the program, has seen 54 local employers provide employment for 200 students in 43 different occupations. Four of these employers, Columbia District Hospital, Hi-School Pharmacy, Safeway and the Village Inn have been able to continue with the D. O. Program the past seven years and have contributed to the training of 60 students.

Varsity diamond won their first league game of this season over the McMinnville Grizzlies by a score of 7-3; their league record now stands at one win and seven losses.

The game proved to be a tough one in the first couple of innings as Mac scored once in the first and the Lions scored one in the second inning. St. Helens didn't really pull away until the fourth inning as they scored four times with Mike McCain, Scott Clark, Mike Ross and Jeff Templeton all scoring.

Mac tried to close the scoring as they scored in the fifth, but the Lions came back in the 6th and scored twice again, and it was Ross and Templeton who came across the plate. In Mac's final desperate inning they were only able to bring across one run which ended all scoring, 7-3 in favor of St. Helens.

Scott Clark pitched the whole game for the Lions and up to last week had an earned run average of .1172, the best on the team.

Rick Luttrell is now leading in batting averages with an average of .394 but followed closely by Randy VonAllman with .348 and Greg Jensen with .320, and the team also has three more players with an average over .238, and Jeff Templeton .222.

Along with the victory over Mac the team also gained three other victories during the week. They took a par from Seaside and split a game with Barlow.
