





The last issue of Kar Korner for The last issue of Kar Korner for the 1973 school year is devoted to Mr. Branum's 1969 Orange Porsche. This car has been sitting in the SHSHS parking lot for quite a bit of the year but was saved for the last issue of the Lions Roar.

This car, considered by many to be a very special car if not the best, is a two door, 911 fastback.

best, is a two door, 911 fastback.

It has a horizontal apposed over head cam six, with aluminum block and heads, cast iron cylinder liners, and eight main bearings which makes light weight but very sturdy, and high reaving engine. This Porsche has a 121 cubic inch displacement. (It a 121 cubic inch displacement. (If may not sound like many cubic inches but with six Weber carbureators it develops 130 horsepower which will make this cartop out at about 130 mph, which is faster than a lot of cars with three times the cubic inch and horsepower.) horsepower.)

This good performance is primarily due to the power to weight ratio. According to many automotive magazines this car is especially good for evernering. What goes must stop, right? This car is equipped with fourwheel disc brakes which helps control this car even at higher speeds. There is four-wheel in-

control this car even at higher speeds. There is four-wheel in-dependent suspension with the engine positioned in the rear of the car which produces a very

good balance, which contributes greatly to the excellent cornering ability of this little hot rod. There is also a low geared rear-end which adds much to the great

take off ability.

The interior features full instrumentation including fuel indicator, and an oil temperature gauge. What else can a guy ask for? Black leather seats highlight the car very well.

This car is set off by mag-type

Porsche racing wheels and Michlen X tires.

For all of this performance and luxury, Mr. Branum gets about 25 miles per gallon (which may come in handy during the gas shortage crisis!) Pretty good

PSU sponsoring summer program

Summer session classes at Portland State University are open to all high school students — from freshmen interested perhaps in a foreign language or music class to seniors who want to get an early start on their college careers.

formal admission is required to attend summer classes. A student simply needs to obtain A student singly needs to obtain a registration ticket request from the summer session office by June 15 and then sign up for the class he or she wants. (A social

security number is also required.)
Grades are permanently recorded and credits may be applied after the student has gained admittance to PSU or another school which accepts transfer credits. transfer credits

transfer credits.

Over 700 regular courses and 100 special programs are offered between June 18 and September 7. They run from one to eight weeks. A number of visiting professors join three-fourths of PSU's regular faculty.

Tuition is the same as during the regular academic year (172 for 12-21 credits although a student may pay for only one course if that's all he or she takes). Deferred tuition, which allows any student to pay his tuiallows any student to pay his tui-

tion in three installments during the summer, is available. Additionally the student em-

Additionally the student employment office is open to match students up with the jobs of their choice. A variety of other financial aids programs are available. available

Information regarding summer session is available in the summer session catalog/time schedule. It includes information schedule. It includes information on courses, programs and registration. The catalog/time schedule can be obtained now in person or by mail from the PSU Summer Session office, room 107 Francis Manor, 614 S.W. Montgomery, telephone number 229-4081.

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

Diamonmen down Rainier


Varsity diamond men traveled to Rainier April 28 and took a pair away from them as they won 7-2 and 11-4. In the first game Ron Barrick
